OUR SCHOOL HISTORY

Miyagi First Senior High School has undergone many changes. The school was first opened as Sendai Municipal Girls' High School in 1897. Two years later, the present school song was decided. In 1906, the school emblem "Maru-ni-Matsukawabishi" was decided. In 1918, the school name was changed into Miyagi Prefectural First Girls' High School. Its student government was very active and successfully won the abolition of controls on uniforms in 1973. Miyagi First is the only girls' high school in Miyagi Prefecture that allows students the freedom of choice in their school life. The year 1997 was its 100th anniversary. In the same year, Science and Math Course was newly opened in order to highly educate future scientists and doctors. In 2002, the Japanese Ministry of Education, Culture and Sports, Science and Technology inducted Miyagi First as one of the first 26 Super Science High Schools throughout Japan. In 2008, the school adopted to become a co-ed high school due to the educational system reform of Miyagi Prefecture and changed its school name into Miyagi First Senior High School. On the occasion of its 120th anniversary, in 2016, thanks to the help of a couple of graduates, the school had an esteemed sister school in England, City of London Free-

men's School. In 2018, 9 students visited England as representatives of the school. Now the school is the leading school in Miyagi Prefecture, open to the world and plays a significant role in striving to raise globally active citizens in various fields.

Since 1897, Miyagi First Senior High School counts more than 31,000 graduates who are playing active roles both inside and outside of the country. Miyagi First Senior High School is situated in a well-established residential area in the urban center of Sendai, the north east part of Japan about 350 km from Tokyo. The school has a proven record of outstanding academic results. It also has a proud record of cultural and other extra curricula achievements as ever. Students are conscious of their autonomy and manage to organize things independently. This attitude cultivates their talents effectively and realizes their full potential. Teachers always seek to provide a positive learning environment for students and a professional culture where they feel valued and want to contribute to the many and varied aspects of their school life.
